Sort out your layovers.

Booking flights with layovers is a great way to save money in comparison to non-stop flights, but it's important to make sure everything is squared away so you don't miss the second leg of your trip. "Be careful not to book flights that are on the same airline, but do not operate from the same terminal," Eric Grayson, founder of Discover 7 travel agency, tells *Teen Vogue*. Some airlines operate from multiple terminals, so before you book your ticket, double check that you won't have to change terminals during your layover, and potentially miss your connection because of the time needed to do so.

Don't put all your faith in reviews.

"One of the common mistakes that I see often is blindly following...reviews," Mina Agnos, president and co-founder of Travelive tells *Teen Vogue*. "The problem with online reviews is that they are often unqualified. In essence, the reviewer has their own set of criteria on which they judge a property or a service. If your criteria is not the same, then your outcome would likely not be the same either."

To help figure out which reviews to trust, <u>Grayson says</u> he finds reviewers who have stayed at properties he's also visited "to see if my taste is in line with the reviewer," and who also reviewed hotels he's considering for a future trip. "If we agree on one place, we will probably agree on another," he says.
